HOSPICE MIRAMICHI INC

Hospice Miramichi Inc is proud to announce the naming of their hospice home, "Vondy House", located at 51 Lobban Ave, 4th floor. We thank John Bosma for his research into Dr. Vondy's work as the first palliative physician in Miramichi.

Given Dr. Vondy's voluntary dedication to providing medical care to quarantined refugees, we believe it is most fitting that we view him as Miramichi's first palliative physician and name our hospice after him.

Dr. John Vondy set up practice in Chatham, NB in April 1847. Thousands of refugees from the famine in Ireland arrived that year, many with the disease of typhus. The barque Looshtauk arrived June 2, 1847, with several ill passengers.

A temporary shelter was built on Middle Island, about two miles from Chatham and passengers were discharged

there. The port medical officers refused to go to the island. The authorities had to find a doctor and John Vondy volunteered his services.

Facilities were completely inadequate, dysentery ensued, and with the arrival of two additional ships, Dr. Vondy cared for more than 300 patients, his only help one man and a boy.

He became ill, and eventually Dr John Thomson agreed to visit daily. Dr. Vondy's sister arrived to nurse him, but he died on June 29, aged 26 years and only 27 days after he volunteered to help the ill.

Although all the victims of the fever were buried on the island, the authorities agreed to allow Vondy's body to be



Dr. John Vondy died at age 26 in 1847, after caring for more than 300 immigrant patients who were quarantined on Middle Island, before falling ill himself. interred in St Paul's churchyard at Bushville. A plaque bearing the following words was erected at the church by public subscription:

This memorial was erected as a public testimonial of respect to the memory of John Vondy, esq., surgeon, who in the faithful discharge of his professional duty, fell victim of malignant fever which prevailed on Middle Island among the passengers of the ship Looshtauk.

Dr. John Vondy gave his life trying to help suffering immigrants at a time when many other doctors refused to tend to them.

Our hospice services are available to any of the approximately 65,000 people in the Miramichi Horizon Health Zone 7 Region. We have created nine full-time, one part-time and six casual job positions.

People of the River

Hi and welcome. My name is Douglas, but I prefer Doug. These senior apartments are comfortable with many services, a fine staff, and friendly fellow residents.

But what I most enjoy is often beyond my reach now. My arthritic knees sometimes kick up when I want to look at the river. But this warm July evening soothes those knees and allows me to stand at the window. I watch the river gliding powerfully and silently past just a few hundred feet away.

This community of Miramichi, New Brunswick, was once a port for large cargo ships from all parts of the world. It shut down with the collapse of the forestry industry. The river nurtured my body and soul; first as a boy and then as a young man, I spent countless hours rowing a punt (square-end rowboat). The river and I became friends. I learned her moods, with the wind and currents acting as guides.

A southwest breeze on a quiet summer morning was particularly exhilarating, gently caressing my face as I rowed into it. Painful at first when forming, the thick calluses on my hands became evidence of my joy with the river. Combined with my muscled arms and legs, I felt invincible, the pride of vouth.

My parents and I enjoyed many summer evenings on our verandah, a bit upriver from here. Watching the sunsets, we were captivated by a montage of rich red, orange and purple hues. They were framed by clouds refracting the light into a kaleidoscope of subtle colours.

My father, a man of practical persuasion, was driven to an artistic obsession trying to capture those passing sunsets through the lens of his camera. The photos numbered in the hundreds. I have one here. You can see the last rays of the setting sun peek above our nearby island, which appears ink-black and brooding. The river is a mirror reflecting in dazzling precision the rose-tinted clouds.

Dad and Mom taught me to learn from people and events I experienced as a boy and young man. Our small community of Miramichi had an outsized reputation for its many characters and so was a perfect classroom. Those people were ordinary folks, with many quietly living extraordinary lives.

The Miramichi region has experienced massive changes over time, some of which will alter its future. Most of the characters of my youth are gone, but there remains a uniqueness and quite strength in the people of the river.

Writing Through Life's Challenges: Chantal MacDonald's Inspirational Author Journey

Chantal MacDonald is an author, and a teacher by trade with a Master of Arts in English Literature from the University of Ottawa. In early 2020 she was a stay-at-home mom to three young children under four years old, and she decided to write a novel.

As we all know, the year 2020 came with a special set of restrictions and obstacles, and as Chantal said in her blog, it is a miracle she accomplished anything at all, let alone write her first novel. But she did. And this spring she published her third book in the series.

I am so inspired by her journey and how she found time to "write in the margins" of her days, and I know our Giv'er readers will be too. Chantal is a Miramichier who grew up in Sunny Corner and now lives in Moncton with her husband and children.

Q: Tell us about the books you've written.

I have written three novels: *Hope at the Ocean's Edge* (2022), *A Harbour for Broken Hearts* (2023), and *Peace on a New Horizon* (spring 2024). I have also written two children's picture books: *Lester the Lobster and the Great Escape* and *Lorraine the Lobster Feels Blue*. Both children's books have been translated into French.

Hope at the Ocean's Edge is the first book in the Sadie Jones series. The genre is Young Adult Christian fiction, and I wrote these novels with the hope that it would provide young women with a wholesome, yet engaging option for literary entertainment.

The first book follows the main character Sadie Jones who experienced

extreme devastation at only nine years old. Now on the cusp of her high school graduation, Sadie is more than ready for a future that will take her away from the small town of Lunenburg, Nova Scotia.

As the year is wrapping up, she catches the attention of a cute lobster fisherman who works down at the local docks. Tom Carter is everything Sadie would want—he's charming, honest, and hardworking, but will he ever be able to accept her distrust of God?


When a stranger from her mother's past reaches out, Sadie finds herself poised to experience the culture and adventure she's always dreamed of, but she also is on the brink of emotional breakdown.

I hope that as readers follow Sadie through her struggles and triumphs (whether one book or them all) that they will be encouraged in their own journeys. There is hope and peace to be found, even in the hard seasons of life.

Q: How did you come to the story idea and characters in Hope at the Ocean's Edge, and did you know it would be a series when you began?

When I first began writing I knew that I wanted this story to be a series there was so much story to share! Although I was doubtful if I would be able to successfully write one book let alone several.

When I began compiling my ideas, there were a few important details that I knew I wanted to include: the main character needed to be entering life outside of high school; the setting needed to be an Atlantic Canadian fishing town (a nod to my Miramichi



upbringing); and there needed to be themes of hope while facing some of the harsh realities of life.

From there I just began to write. There are two kinds of writers planners and pantsers (those who write by the seat of their pants). I am the latter. I knew where I wanted to start and I knew where I wanted to end, the in-between was a bit of a mystery at times. The characters and circumstances unfolded as I wrote, several of them surprising even me.

Q: *Did you encounter any obstacles when writing the book and how did you overcome them?*

I'm a mom of three young children and I began writing this book when my youngest was three months old. The biggest obstacle in the beginning was time. I can remember rocking my baby with my laptop balanced on my knees and typing with one hand. I can also remember writing in fifteen-minute intervals because one of my children kept waking up. That season of my writing career was marked by baby steps. It took two years of showing up for myself in tiny snippets of time before I was able to hold a completed manuscript in my hands.


I saw other writers talking about daily word counts in the thousands and solo writing retreats. That was not feasible for me, especially considering we were thrust into a global pandemic almost immediately after I began to write. I needed to understand and embrace my season of life, and that meant small steps toward my goal instead of leaps. But I realized that small, consistent steps in the right direction will get you where you want to go.


And life changes quickly. What took me two years for my first book has taken six months for my third. I've gotten faster in my writing and have found what works best for my life and schedule. My writing window is usually after my children are in bed at night. I do my best to maximize the small windows of time that I can carve out of my day. It's also much easier to write when I am consistent. I figured out what worked for me and stuck with it.

Q: What method did you use for publishing your books?

I think there are lots of great paths available to writers who want to publish and there are pros and cons to them all. I prioritized the guarantee of a published book over the possibility of being signed by a publishing company. As such, I immediately decided to selfpublish. There was much to learn about the process, but having done it several times over, I'm confident now in the process and the outcome.

The publishing world is changing. Self-publishing and hybrid publishers have less negative stigma attached to them. They are a guaranteed option for anyone willing to put in the work.





And with an estimated 81% of people dreaming of writing a book (according to a survey published in the NY Times), I've committed to encouraging and assisting people who are interested in self-publishing. I believe in self-publishing as a great path to launching books into the world.

Q: *What are your goals as a writer*?

In terms of my writing goals, I would love to have the Sadie Jones series (four books total) finished by spring 2025. I have ideas and plans to write a standalone Christmas novella as well as some spin off stories from the series. I would also love to continue writing children's picture books and expanding on those I've already published.

Q: What advice would you give to a first-time writer, someone just starting out, who has an idea but no experience?

I would say just open a notebook or Word document and begin to write. Don't overthink it. Don't start researching publishing or printing options. Don't even spend a lot of time on honing your craft. You cannot edit an empty journal. You cannot publish a blank page. The difference between the 81% who want to write a book and the 3% who actually finish a manuscript is actually sitting down consistently and putting words to paper. Carve out time somewhere, make it a priority, and keep showing up to get the story out. The rest will come later.

Q: Is there anything else you would like people to know about yourself or your books?

I always want my books to be uplifting. The world can be dark and depressing, and there are beautiful books that engage with tough themes. For me, real life is hard enough. I want my books to be a place of hope in the face of some of those tough situations. While my characters will struggle through some authentic issues, I can promise that there will never be any dark, depressing, or explicit content in my books and that the stories will all end happily and with hope.

A Review of Soldiers



SOLDIERS of the North Shore (New Brunswick) Regiment, WW2 (Who They Were and the Battles They Fought) by Bruce Morton, is a history of Canada's contribution to WW2, told in brief biographies of about 200 soldiers of all ranks.

At all times during the war, the majority of these NS (NB) Regt. soldiers were men who were born in New Brunswick or were living there before the war. About 60% were of English, Irish, or Scottish descent, 35% were French, and the balance were First Nations, Blacks and others. Biographies of First Nations soldiers include Peter Barlow, Clarence Simpson, and Walter Trumbley. Biographies of

Black soldiers include Sydney Falls, Anselm Knox, and Harold Moss.

The North Shore (NB) Regiment was part of the first wave of the landing on Juno Beach on D-Day (June 6, 1944). *SOLDIERS* describes their casualty-intensive battles in Normandy, the capture of the French ports



along the English Channel, the brutal Battle of the Scheldt, and the Invasion of Germany.

During the campaign that began on June 6, 1944, and ended on May 5, 1945, the North Shore (NB) Regiment suffered 1,314 casualties: 371 were killed and 943 were wounded. The War Diary records the strength of the regiment on May 31, 1945, at 1,050 men. This number would include wounded from the earlier battles like Carpiquet who recovered and returned. Approximately ninety of the men who started with the regiment on D-Day were still with them at the end of the war.

Most of the men who served

with the NS (NB) Regt. had lived through the ten years of the Great Depression (1929–39). Unemployment at times was estimated to be as high as 30%. There was no employment insurance, very few government welfare programs, no Canada Pension, and no provincial health care programs.



Awards to NS (NB) Regt. soldiers included six Distinguished Service Order (DSO), seven Military Crosses (MC), two Distinguished Conduct Medals (DCM), and two Military Medals (MM).


Private George Herman Baker, NS (NB) Regt., seen prior to disembarking the landing craft on Juno Beach, D-Day, June 6, 1944.




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
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How Does Your Garden Grow?


Details and Close-ups: Try zooming in to capture the intricate
